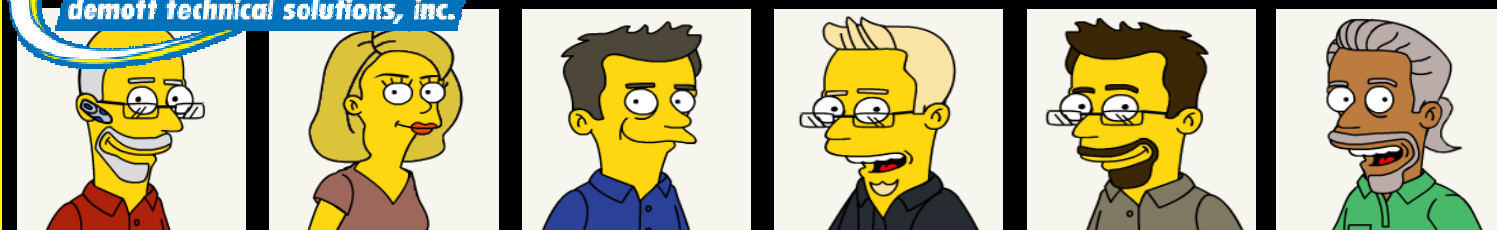

Are You Prepared for Severe Weather Season?

According to the National Weather Service, the United States experiences some 1,000 tornadoes each year, most occurring between the months of April and June. Nine-Year-Old whiz kid writes iPhone app

While most children his age sketch on paper with crayons, 9-year-old Lim Ding Wen from Singapore, has a very different canvas—his iPhone.

Lim, who is in fourth grade, writes application for Apple's popular iPhone. His latest, a painting program called Doodle Kids, has been downloaded over 4,000 times from Apple's iTunes store in two weeks.

The program lets iPhone users draw with their fingers by touching the iPhone's touch screen and then clear the screen by shaking the phone.

"I wrote the program for my younger sisters, who like to draw," Lim said. His sisters are aged 3 and 5.

Lim, who is fluent in six programming languages, started using the computer at the age of 2. He has since completed about 20 programming projects. "Every evening we check the statistics e-mailed to us (by iTunes) to see who has more downloads," the older Lim said.

The boy, who enjoys reading books on programming, is in the process of writing another iPhone application—a science fiction game called "Invader Wars."

Facebook's New Design

As most of you all may have noticed over the last month, Facebook has implemented a new design to their page. From what I have heard, most people do not like it compared to the older version. Unfortunately, since this is a web based application, there is no way to speed up the load time. You are dependant on Facebook's server and their internet connection speed.

Ask The Tech

Q. I mistakenly deleted a Microsoft Word document from the shared "S" Drive—how can I retrieve?

A. Whenever a file is deleted off the Network (Shared Drive) no Recycle Bin is available for that file to go to, so it simply just deletes with no restore point outside of a Backup, but if you delete a file and realize it IMMEDIATELY you can press CTRL + Z to use the UNDO function. If not, the file will need to be restored from the latest backup.

Q. Several times I had a message come up on my screen "Storage Device Connected. If this device is a port multiplier only port 0 of the port multiplier will be active."

A. This is a known issue for Dell and is related to how the Intel Storage manager is interacting with windows. They are in the works of the fix but this workaround will help. 1. Right click on the taskbar and select properties. 2. In the taskbar tab at the bottom click the customize button. 3. Scroll down to past items and find the popup message and change it to always hide. This should stop the pop-ups from happening until a patch is released.

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
